# **How Will You Serve?**

Welcome to 2017, the year we are sent forth to serve. And our first opportunity to serve is (literally) right around the corner.

The cold weather shelter program was begun more than 25 years ago by the Whittier Area Interfaith Council. Each year, our meeting joins together with other churches to address the needs of Whittier's marginalized residents living on the streets by giving aid and shelter through the winter months. The shelter rotates around different churches within the community.

The program has space for up to 40 people after they are prescreened for drugs and alcohol. Each person gets a dinner, a place to sleep, a blanket and breakfast. Guests leave early in the morning and return for dinner later in the day.

This winter, eight churches are taking turns providing shelter from November through March. We are once again supporting this worthy program by co-

hosting with First United Methodist Church on Bailey Street, cooking dinner, supplying breakfast food and providing volunteers for overnight supervision.

The cold weather shelter program costs about \$10,000. \$5,000 comes from the city of Whittier and the rest is raised by the churches within the community.



First United Methodist is graciously opening their doors for three weeks. They will provide an accessible



location for dinner and sleeping, and our meeting is pitching in with the meals and overnight supervision from Monday evening, January 9 through Monday morning, January 16. This is the opportunity to also spend time getting to know our neighbors. If you are a little shy, see Loletta, Marilyn or Lynda to get encouragement on how you, too, can be part of this valuable ministry of connecting with God's people who live amongst us. Come, greet and join in a conversation. That's all there really is to it.

We are grateful to Friends who have already signed up. And we need you, too! Help us prepare meals, supervise overnight and provide a warm welcome for our guests. There is a BIG need for supervisors (one male, one female) to be on site each night from 6 p.m. to 12 a.m. and 12 to 7 a.m. each morning. Coffee and breakfast are free to volunteers.

Please prayerfully consider how you can serve. The sign-up sheet is in Founders Court on Sundays and in the church office during the week. So please call or stop in—there's no better way to start the year we are sent forth to serve.

#### Loletta's Lines

Our meeting is engaging in a three-year examination of our mission statement; "A Christian people, called to listen, gathered to seek peace, and sent forth to serve." This is shorthand for



the longer statement approved by Friends at Monthly Meeting on First Month Thirteenth, 2002. It reads "Whittier First Friends—a Christian people called to listen through our distinctive approach to worship, gathered to seek peace through the experience of Christ in our lives as evidenced by our testimonies, and sent forth to serve our community."

We now have the opportunity to examine what we mean by "sent forth to serve," and even more prayerfully, consider how God intends these words to shape our lives as a meeting. It might seem simple. Sent means we have to go. Forth means we have to leave the building. Serve is doing something for others.

But as I thought about it, I realized "sent" is not just going; it implies being impelled, commissioned, ordained and filled with the Spirit to go on a mission. And "forth" is not a passive movement; it begins from a starting point and goes in a forward direction. In nature's images, it expands like a plant shooting out fresh branches and roots, explodes like a bursting flow of lava, charges like a herd of antelope up a mountain, and springs into blossoming new life. There is a sense of urgency.

We are sent forth to spread the Good News and stretch forth our hands to save others from despair. And serving in the way of Jesus is the most humble and the most exalted of roles; for Jesus did not do "charity" or "charitable giving." Serving as he did means truly seeing and hearing people, their pain and joy, and taking risks to walk alongside them in their daily lives as a healing, peaceful, encouraging, empowering presence. The result is a treasure beyond price.

Our spending was projected to be very close to, or slightly over the budgeted amount approved to be used from our reserves. Three actions were approved:

- 1) Encourage all committees to limit spending to only essential commitments for the remainder of 2016,
- 2) Encourage Friends to consider an increase in their 2016 giving, by giving a "53rd week" offering to boost the meeting income for 2016,
- 3) Allow spending up to \$7,000 above the 2016 approved budget from reserves.

This increased spending limit is intended to ensure the Meeting can meet our commitments to pay all our bills, and specifically include the balance of our Significant Outreach (\$3,000) and Western Association of the Society of Religious Friends contributions (\$4,000.) A sampling of Significant Outreach in 2016 includes local support of the Interfaith Food Center, First Day Center, H.O.W. House, St. Matthias Soup Hour, Whittier Friends School and the Women and Childrens' Crisis Shelter. Internationally, we support Kenya peace teams, Ramallah Friends School, Friends Theological College, Belize Friends School, Heifer Project International for the continuing relief needed in Nepal, and Church World Service for aid in the Syrian refugee crisis.

Monthly Meeting requested that we all prayerfully consider these approved actions to support the meeting, including participating in the "53rd week" of giving.

Please note that if your gift is to go to the 2016 shortfall, you need to clearly state that intention. All gifts given in January towards the 2016 shortfall will show in 2017 for your tax year purposes.

In addition, Friends who have not yet turned in their pledge card for 2017 are encouraged to do so as soon as possible. This will facilitate presentation of the 2017 budget at the February Monthly meeting.

The first Monthly Meeting of the New Year is Sunday, January 8. Jim Hopkins is the guest chef. On the menu are Brunch Bake Casserole with banana and blueberry bread and fruit salad.



Recently Whittier Friends school's TK-6th grade class did an experiment with pumpkins. Taking two giant pumpkins that had been on display in the Meeting House for the Thanksgiving harvest display, we estimated how much they weighed and how many seeds were inside. We then counted the seeds and weighed the pumpkin.



The TK-2nd grade kids counted the seeds in groups of ten and the 4th-6th grade kids converted the measurements of the pumpkin weight. When we added the weight, the older kids converted the improper fractions so that we could add them with each other. We had hypothesized which pumpkin would be heavier and have more seeds. Pumpkin D weighed 11 pounds and had 167 seeds. Pumpkin C weighed 14.06 pounds and had zero seeds! We think the pumpkin was not mature enough to have fully grown seeds.

These experiments are good for education because we can learn how to be a better active participant. If someone asks us about something we experimented on then we can answer their question. Not only is it fun, but you also get to improve your skills in the scientific method. We would love to give a special shout-out to Mary Mashburn, for donating the pumpkins in the first place.

### **Quaker Forum is Coming**

Quaker Forum is March 4. Jan Wood, director of Good News Associates, will facilitate a full day workshop based on the third part of our mission statement "Sent Forth To Serve" and will bring the message on Sunday, March 5. Jan is a former pastor, teacher, administrator, and gifted minister, called to writing and speaking, organizational consulting, and spiritual direction.

#### Sent Forth, Going Forth— The Travel Minute

Our year of "Sent Forth To Serve" is a good opportunity to learn more about the Quaker tradition of the travel minute. This tradition of traveling to undertake service to others dates back more than 300 years, allowing Friends to learn more about the world as they serve.

A meeting can express support for the leading of a Friend, in a letter of introduction or a minute of travel. It can take the form much like a letter of introduction. It is signed by the clerk of the monthly meeting identifying the person who is traveling as a Friend or regular attender in good standing. A travel minute may include greetings, ask for loving care of the Friend, confirm the person is a Friend and has approval to travel in the ministry, affirm their gifts and reason for travel, and close with a prayer of blessing.

An endorsement, written on the bottom of the letter, may be received from the receiving meeting. It may simply return greetings to the Friend's meeting. It may also comment on the visit, explain how the visit was received by Friends, and report on the faithfulness of the traveling Friends to their work, to God, and to their meetings. Endorsement is one way of holding the traveling Friend accountable for the right use of his or her gifts.

As Friends go forth to serve, whether as individuals or groups, formally or informally, it is important that we recognize that they, and we, are seen as representatives of our meeting and Friends. While Friends are humble in their service, encouragement and support by prayer and recommendation, and recognition of gifts of service that are used well and generously can only improve our Friends, Meeting and the world.


