#### **Russ' Reflections**

One of the fundamental images of Quakerism is of "light." We each carry the light of God within us. It follows that God is or carries light. On March 17th, at 11 am, the Friends Choir will present a choral service all about light:



Light in Deepest Night, by Aaron David Miller, based on the mystical writings of Julian of Norwich (c.1342 - after 1416). We have presented this work twice before, but it seemed like an appropriate time to offer it again. This worship experience draws on Julian's reflections on life, love, and light. She was known to have had mystical visions in her life. One of her more interesting images was of Christ as our mother. Her ideas may be from the Medieval period, but they can speak to us today.

The service will include anthems, hymns, and short spoken meditations. Hymns will include: "Oh, Love How Deep, How Broad, How High"; "Mothering God, You Gave Me Birth"; "O Trinity, O Blessed Light"; and "Tree of Life". The choir will offer six pieces that explore aspects of Julian's vision. We will be joined by a couple of instruments which will add color to the music. Members of the choir will share prayers and brief meditations that give a glimpse of Julian's thinking and how it might relate to us.

A famous quote by Julian is: "All will be well, and all manner of things shall be well." It is our hope that this music will lift our spirits at this time when there is much darkness in our world, and that Julian's notion that all will be well will come to fruition. Please consider attending in person, if you are able, in order to lend your voices to the singing. Invite someone to join you!

# Mission Collaborative Helps Get the *Waystation* Set Up

The Mission Collaborative (of which First Friends is a part of) had a wonderful group of 14 people join together on Saturday, Feb 17, at Whittier First United Methodist Church, Whittier, to prepare a room for use as a local waystation. Pastor Jon Waterson provided direction and information about how this space would be used. He explained that people who are coming into the country in Calexico as legal immigrants and refugees are themselves stuck without housing from the time they arrive until they get to their sponsor family. For some, this means sleeping in a bus or train station for a day or two until transportation is available to another part of our country.

The goal is for churches from the Mission Collaborative to be able to serve as hosts for individuals and families in need of a 1-2 night stay on their way to their sponsors. We hope that once or twice a month, when families depart from Los Angeles or North Orange County on their way to their immigration sponsors, the waystation at Whittier First UMC can provide a welcome and safe space along the way. As this ministry project takes shape, we look forward to ways in which we can get involved.



## First Friends Celebrates the Life of Gwen Woirhaye



On February 3, 2024, the life and legacy of Gwen Woirhaye was remembered, honored, and celebrated by her family, friends, FFC church members, and many people from the Whittier community that filled the meeting house or joined online. After a welcome and opening prayer by pastor Loletta Barrett, Gwen's daughter-in-law, Deanna Woirhaye, offered an adaptation of Psalm 46:10, "Be still and know that I am God" that aptly characterized Gwen's sense of inner peace. The opening hymn was "Simple Gifts", a traditional American Shaker song, to commemorate Gwen's gentle, kind, wise, and loving spirit. Marie Hegwer-DiVita - a member of the Writing Group which meets on Monday afternoons at First Friends - followed by reading a selection from Gwen's large collection of personal memoirs, entitled "Dressing for the Holidays" which gave a little insight into Gwen's thoughts on her love of sewing and her unique personal style.

Deanna then shared her gratitude for Gwen's guidance and inspiration through her loving acceptance and example of service and

advocacy within the community. Three of Gwen's grandchildren, Cedric, Anathea, and Elyse Woirehaye, who all grew up in the meeting, each gave their own moving examples of how she had inspired and influenced them through her comforting spirit and supportive love, as well her enjoyment of theater arts, works of Shakespeare), (especially the literature, travel, sewing, community service, and a general love of life. One of Gwen's sons, Brendon Woirhaye, paid tribute to his mother's parenting style which supported his curiosity, creativity, and passions as a child. Pastor read Gwen's husband Mahlon's Loletta reflection on a life lived with this talented and loving wife, mother, and cherished travel companion.

Several attendees also shared fond memories and tributes to her character, including former neighborhood children who noted her openness and acceptance, her support of creative play, and the lure of her unique and fanciful home. Whittier College graduate and former Whittier Friends School teacher, Alicia, fondly remembered Gwen's generous support of her society pledging experience.

Closing music was "This Little Light of Mine" followed by an instrumental rendition of "Happy Trails" which Cedric had noted that she used to sing to him as a tot when he was inconsolably missing his parents.

The service was followed by an elegant luncheon reception in Fellowship Hall featuring Gwen's favorite color, red, with catering provided by Crepes and Grapes Cafe of Uptown Whittier and dessert cookies contributed by members of the meeting. Guests enjoyed viewing Gwen's vast collection of decorative nutcrackers, examples of her knitting, crocheting, and sewing projects, as well as several albums of her personal memoirs. Sharing and socializing continued well into the afternoon with many attendees reluctant to



say good-bye. One guest remarked, "Gwen would have loved this party." The event was a poignant of reminder her annual **Boxing** Day celebrations which many of us fondly remember.

Gwen passed to new life on the evening of

December 25, this past year. She was born in Flint Michigan on September 24, 1938, and moved to California in 1945. After graduating from High School in Monrovia, California, she earned her degree from Whittier College, and has remained in Whittier ever since. She taught in the Whittier Elementary School district for eight years before leaving to raise her sons with husband Mahlon.

In addition to Gwen's extensive involvement in local community organizations, including the American Association of University Women, Whittier Peace Coalition, Whittier Cultural Arts Foundation, Whittier Genealogical Society, Whittier Historic Neighborhood Association, and PEO, she was also very involved in Whittier First Friends Church where she worked in the office from 1990 to 2003. Through the years she served on numerous committees, was president of the Women's Society for multiple terms, convened the Memoirs Writing Group the past several years, and instrumental in the founding of The Growing Place which is now Whittier Friends School, which will celebrate its 50th anniversary this year.

Gwen is survived by husband Mahlon; children Mahlon III, Brendon, and Loren; daughter-in-law Deanna; grandchildren Cedric Woirhaye. Anathea Woirhaye, Elyse Woirhaye, Ashley Roberts, Kaleb Woirhaye, Summer Stevens, Roberts.

## **Thoughts and Prayers from Students** at Ramallah Friends School

Last fall, to celebrate World Quaker Day, we asked Friends in our meeting and those we know around the globe to share what being a Quaker means to them. Rania Maayeh, Head of School at Ramallah Friends School, a Quaker school on the West Bank, forwarded the following thoughts from students at the school:

From a 2nd-grader: "I wish I could share my flashlight with people in Gaza so they can see when their power goes out. I wish I could give everyone in Gaza a mattress to sleep on. I wish I could give everyone in Gaza water that is clean for drinking and enough food to eat. I pray kids will be safe in Gaza."

From a 5th-grader: "Our weapon is education, and the secret to ending violence is nonviolence. My prayer is that the war ends by nonviolence, everyone lives in peace, and no one is under occupation anymore."

From an 8th-grader: "I pray that this war will end through nonviolence because violence never solves anything. I also pray that as a global community, we will make a difference by donating water, food, and crucial medical supplies so that every single person in Gaza can and great-granddaughter Adriana , have basic needs. I pray this war will end now."


