Western Friends Convene

First Friends Church participates in the larger world of Quakerism through the Western Association of the Religious Society of Friends (WARSF). Yearly gatherings of this body alternate between our Meeting and Berkeley Friends Church. This year, the WARSF Board of Oversight Meeting and Annual Meeting of Members were held on Friday and Saturday, February 17 and 18, in conjunction with Berkeley's annual Quaker Heritage Day.

The spiritual tone of the gathering was set by Heritage Day speaker Marcelle Martin of Swarthmore (PA) Friends Meeting. Her topic "Our Life is Love" was taken from the title of her book, which our adult Sunday School class, as well as Berkeley's class, has been studying.

Bob Newton represented our Meeting at the Board of Oversight meeting held Friday evening after a potluck supper prepared by Berkeley Friends. Bob and Dharma Galang (Berkeley Friends) have now completed two successive three-year terms on the Board, and, according to the Bylaws, must be replaced. Mel Sturr and Elisabeth Elliot have agreed to represent the Meeting on the Board. Bob Secord has been asked to serve again as Assistant Clerk and Lea Wright will continue as Finance Clerk.

Keith Barton of Berkeley has accepted a one-year appointment as Recording Clerk and Brian Young will continue as Convening Clerk for the coming year. All of these appointments were approved by the Board.

The following appointments from WARSF to larger Friends groups were approved: Bob Secord to Friends United Meeting (where he continues to serve on its General Board); Brian Young and Deanna Woirhaye to Friends World Committee for Consultation Section of the Americas; Dorothy Kakimoto of Berkeley to continue with the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), and Tim Root and Sue and Rob Settlage along with John Maurer of Berkeley and Elisabeth Elliot (tentatively)) to Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL).

A financial statement for 2016, reviewed and stated to be correct by Lynda Ladwig, was received. WARSF continues to be in good financial health. The 2017 budget, essentially the same as for 2016, was approved.

Brian Young reported that WARSF had received an inquiry from an individual in one of a group of churches now part of Northwest Yearly Meeting, which is in the process of restructuring. This group hopes to organize in a way that will welcome diversity in their membership. The Board approved of entering

Sing, Sing All Earth!

The Friends Choir will offer "Missa Gaia" (Earth Mass), A Mass in Celebration of Mother Earth, as the Message in Music at Meeting for Worship on Sunday, April 23. Written by Paul Winter and his associates Jim Scott, Paul Halley, Oscar Castro-Neves, Kim Oler and Jeremy Geffen, the Mass premiered at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City on May 10, 1981.

Paul Winter envisioned a celebration that was both ecumenical and ecological, that would embrace all life on Earth. Wild animal calls, African and Brazilian percussion accompany the serene voices of the choir, and a sense of celebration for the congregation infuses the work. The backbone of "Missa Gaia" is four texts from the ordinary of Mass, Kyrie Eleison (Lord, have mercy), a four note motive from a wolf howl; Sanctus (Holy) and Benedictus (Blessed is He who comes), from whale song, and Agnus Dei (Lamb of God), with harp seal calls. Colleagues contributed ideas for melodies, rhythms and harmonies for other elements that include the Beatitudes, St. Francis' "Canticle of Brother Sun" and two original songs.

The Friends Choir will be joined by an ensemble of instruments, including saxophone, percussion, piano, bass and guitar. The music mixes elements of jazz, traditional choral writing, and world percussion to produce an upbeat celebration of Earth and the Divine Creator.

Invite a friend and come celebrate Mother Earth as we worship God through the ancient words of the Mass and contemporary expressions of faith that come together in this excellent music.
