Music Sunday Celebrates Light

The Friends Choir will present a service of music and readings, Light in Deepest Night, at Music Sunday on April 7. The piece is composed by Aaron David Miller, Music Director at House of Hope Presbyterian Church in St. Paul, Minnesota, and his father, David L. Miller, Lutheran pastor and former dean of the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. The music is scored for two instruments and organ-we will be using oboes. The service is based on the writings of Julian of Norwich (1342-1416), medieval English anchoress and councilor. Her Revelations of Divine Love, based on a series of her visions, offers a message of hope and trust in the love of God through the saving works of Jesus, who she refers to as mother. The two Millers, father and son, through scripture, meditations, and music, give a glimpse into Julian's theology and its resonance with today. Come and find light in the darkness with us.

On Saturday, March 9, Whittier Friends School students Elyse Woirhaye and Matthew Horbino went to San Gabriel High School to present their Stonewall Riots project to History Day L.A. judges. Hundreds of students were there presenting projects on the theme "Triumph and Tragedy in History." History Day L.A.

is a countywide history conversation and competition between Los Angeles County students in the grades four through twelve. Third graders at our school created а practice history day project this year so that they will be ready to enter the competition next year.



The Whittier Friends School's Open House on Tuesday, March 5, allowed the children in elementary grades to share science and history day projects with visitors. The theme was Earth's Biomes. Transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and first grade students made their own picture books about their chosen biome, and told visitors about them using felt storyboards made especially for their projects. The middle graders wrote three-paragraph essays about their chosen biome and made dioramas displaying some of the plant and animal life found there. Even the preschoolers had a project on display. Theirs was about making observations comparing a large room temperature bottle of water to a small frozen bottle of water. It was exciting for the children to share their learnings with friends and family members.

Saturday, April 27 will prove to be an exciting Spring Event at Whittier Friends School. The children are in the process of writing their own skits this year, which will focus on ancient history. The event will also include our annual silent auction, dinner, and dessert. We love to collaborate with local businesses when it comes to our silent auction. Remembrance of Things Past

Everyone has interesting stories to tell about their life and times. The Writers Group, who meet every Monday afternoon at the church, reminisce in short essays that are always amusing and sometimes poignant. The Group have, on many previous occasions, read some of their writings at All Friends Fellowship Night, and their recitation on March 13 was one of the most memorable.

Moderator Gwen Woirhaye introduced the first reader, Johanna Nootenboom, who recalled some of her early experiences as they might have been related by her family's favorite gathering place, the kitchen table. Michelline Cassar followed with a similar nostalgic narrative, delivered this time by the family's Christmas tree. Love of family and community pervaded both essays.

Diane Diaz recalled a childhood encounter with an unusually bold mouse. The traumatic incident, told with animation, was most amusing. Sal DiVita collected his memoir writings into a book, with the encouragement of former Writer's Group member Jeananne Coop. Sal shared each new chapter with Jeananne until her valiant fight against cancer ended a few years ago. Nancy Cowardin recorded biographies of young people in juvenile court. Her moving story told of 14-year-old Robert, a withdrawn and seemingly anti-social youth, who unexpectedly bestowed a kindness on a fellow delinquent.

Beverly Harris told of her family's car trip across the country, to arrive in Washington D. C. just at the time of the death of President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Beverly's husband was reassigned to an East Coast naval base during those fateful WWII years. Norm Stevens, often an amusing contributor to AFFN Writers Group presentations, recalled his favorite childhood hobby of collecting bottle caps, and his great discovery that beer-bottle caps could substantially enlarge his collection. Lois McKinney recalled one of the most thrilling moments of her young life, when she won a radio contest ticket to a live performance of her vocalist idol Kay Starr.

Jerry Sarchet is a psychologist whose mission in retirement has become public education on the danger of global warming. His informative message elicited earnest response from Gwen Woirhaye's grandson Cedric, who is studying for a career in environmental science. Gwen McCants remembered the time when her 12-year-old daughter wanted to see a questionable movie. After Gwen consented, with misgivings, she was gratified to hear her daughter pronounce the film "dumb." Gabriel Cassar's family escaped the Armenian Holocaust of the early 1900's by fleeing to Canada. There he met and married co-Writers Group writer Michelline.

Iris Harris wrapped up an evening of interesting life stories by recalling her emotions at her daughter Marina's first performance with the San Francisco Opera. Many years earlier, Iris had aspired to become a professional singer. Like many parents, Iris found a deferred fulfillment in the accomplishments of a child.
