At the annual meeting, WARSF approved using our travel budget, which went unused last year, to make additional contributions to Friends United Meeting and Friends World Committee for Consultation, and to go into the reserve fund.

WARSF is currently addressing a lapse in corporate status filing that has occurred with the state of California. Faith Jansen Brewer of Berkeley is overseeing this effort.

Current WARSF officers/clerks are Convening Clerk Keith Barton of Berkeley, Assistant Convening Clerk Bob Secord, Recording Clerk Dharma Galanga and Treasurer Lea Wright.

Whittier Friends School has a TON of Fund-raising Fun

The current pandemic has posed many challenges for Whittier Friends School this past year, including how to hold our traditional fundraisers while maintaining Covid-19 safety protocols. Our annual Parking Lot Sale was no exception. As a safe alternative, we had a clothing drive with the help of FUNDrive® an organization that helps local nonprofits raise money. Our job was to collect bags of unwanted clothing, linens, bedding, curtains, and other soft goods and deliver them at the appointed time to a collection site in order to be paid by the pound.

We advertised that donations would be accepted in the church parking lot on February 27 from 9 to 2 p.m. In addition to notifying our Meeting, school families, and supporters, we posted on the Next Door app as well as in several local Facebook groups (Positively Whittier; Whittier Community Self Reliance; Whittier, Norwalk, La Mirada, and Santa Fe Springs Offer Up; Whittier's Sharing Economy; The Whittier Neighborhood Watch, and Whittier, California—Our Hometown). We even had a couple donations from neighbors who had seen the sign we placed out in front of the school on collection day.

A few of our generous supporters arranged for early drop-offs and pick-ups so that by the time the big day arrived, the stage in Fellowship Hall was already full of bags. By 2:00 p.m. on collection day, we had doubled the haul!

We thank Steven Caringella for his time, hard work, for sponsoring the rental trailer, and the use of his pick-up truck to transport the bags to the acceptance site to be weighed. And, because our collection surpassed our expectations, we extend our heartfelt thanks to Milton Wright and Dan Wright for their generosity in helping transport bags on short notice. Milton even used his vintage vehicle, so our goods were definitely delivered in style! We were amazed and grateful to learn we had collected 2,637 pounds (over one ton!) of soft goods and earned over \$600 for our efforts.

Thanks to Marielle Askew, Bill Ryder, Lea Wright, and the Caringella family—Cassie, Landon, Avalon, and Hudson—for putting in the time and hard work on collection day. We could not have done it without them.

We also thank everyone who donated and participated in this effort. These funds support our mission to allow children of all ethnicities and backgrounds to share in the diverse and rich learning experience offered by our school.

At March Monthly Meeting on March 14, we welcomed the news that planning for both virtual Peace Camp and a virtual Peace Café have begun.

Because of safety and anti-vandalism concerns, Trustees is recommending that the Meeting consider fencing be installed in Founders Court. This raises the concern of balancing the need for security with our desire for openness. More details and visuals will be available to review at the next Monthly Meeting on April 11. Trustees also reported that one of our rental properties needs extensive renovating and repair, and that they have been contacted by groups that use our facilities about when they can meet again. Opening for group use is being discussed and will follow county guidelines.

Our office administrator Mary Botz is currently on sick leave, with other staff covering some of her duties. Personnel reported that Mary is retiring on June 30, and discussions are underway regarding an updated job description, schedule, and compensation.

Discussion has begun on how best to allocate the recent gift from the Paul Partington estate. It was expressed that we want to make active use of these funds lest they be tucked away and forgotten as well as reluctance to earmark the entire amount at this time. Discussion of this will continue at April Monthly Meeting on April 11.



The Facing Bench

Spring, Easter, and birthdays came together for me. The first two are imminent and I just finished addressing April birthday cards. I enjoy sending cards to family, friends, and Friends—handmade and store-bought, with new and traditional themes, whether religious or funny. But this week I realized I think of Easter as the birthday of the church. Traditionally, Pentecost—the arrival of the Holy Spirit—is considered the birthday of the church. However, the resurrection of Jesus is celebrated as the realization and recognition of the gift of New Life. It is both Life after physical death and the revelation that Life in God makes us a new creation, liberated from all death-dealing oppressions. I think of it as a birth-day that happens once a year and yet happens every moment. Everything is born anew; open to possibilities, new choices and opportunities for life.

As we look at the hope of vaccines and for the end to isolation, a clergy colleague stated what I have been thinking about church and life when they said that their concern is that when we return, it will (consciously or unconsciously) also signal a return to “business as usual.” And I, for one, am about done with the endless work of details and decisions that has come to characterize modern life and church. So very, very much of what we are so busy doing is simply to keep afloat. Continuing church (and life) as we know it simply consumes time and resources. As devastating and tragic as this pandemic has been, it has also afforded us and the Church the opportunity to step back, reassess and (it is to be hoped!) regroup. Spirit seems to be holding out her hand and inviting us all into a new day and a new life—a birthday! While everyone’s vision will differ, has anyone seen and experienced what a new day of doing and being a human being and church might look like?

One colleague replied perhaps we can focus on contemplative and quiet reflection time, inner listening, slowing down, and connecting inside. Hmm, sounds very Friendly indeed. Happy Spring, Happy Easter, and Happy birth/new life day!

If you are attending Meeting for Worship regularly, you will have heard music prepared and recorded by our four section leaders and our Choir Scholar. We meet weekly for a couple of hours on Wednesday evenings to rehearse and record music. We

take each person's temperature, keep our distance, and wear masks while we sing together.

A couple of these singers are new to us since we stopped in-person worship a year ago. Alexandra (Alex) Grabarchuk is the Director of Choral Activities at Whittier College. I approached her about helping us find a soprano, and when we were unsuccessful, she agreed to help us this choir season. We continue to appreciate the talents and musical efforts of Allison Coop, our other mezzo-soprano/alto, Lou Rosen, our baritone, and Aaron Espinosa, our bass Choir Scholar.

Remembering Ann Smith

Betty Ann Parrish Smith was born on April 20, 1929, and passed to new life on February 4th, 2021, at the age of 91. She was born to Leander Seburn and Lula Pearl Parrish in Sedalia, Missouri, as one of six daughters and two sons.

Ann shared stories of a youth filled with a close, loving family, adventures that included climbing to the tops of trees and swaying in the breeze and running barefoot down gravel roads, a father who played the violin, and achieving high marks in her one-room schoolhouse. She attended Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar, Missouri, and graduated with a bachelor's degree in education from Friends University in Wichita, Kansas.

A primary school teacher her entire career, Ann was proud of the work. Parents, fellow teachers, and the principals she worked with respected her talent and passion for teaching, as well as her ability to connect with students.

A lifelong learner, Ann was a strong advocate for education and an avid reader. In her retirement, she continued to read every day, and visited the Whittier Public Library frequently. Another favorite pastime was gardening, and the backyard at her home was often ablaze with colorful flowers and visited by birds and butterflies.

She joined First Friends in the 1970s, and attended Meeting for Worship regularly until age and infirmity made that too challenging. She cherished the weekly letters she received from our pastor, each one with a copy of the sermon for that week and a handwritten note. It was a valued connection to an individual she respected, and a community she loved but could not visit physically.

Ann will be missed by many. Her family loves her and will always remember her gentle, self-effacing manner, kind words, and generosity. Multiple generations of school children continue to benefit from the strong educational foundation she gave them and the optimistic outlook she embodied.

She is survived by her sons Vincent Jerome Smith of Landers, California, and Paul Franklin Smith of Sand City, California; and five grandchildren.

It is with mixed emotions that we share the news that Diane Randall, General Secretary of Friends Committee on National Legislation, recently informed the Executive Committee that she will leave FCNL at the end of 2021 "with a clear and grateful heart."

In an email to FCNL supporters, General Clerk Ron Ferguson shared, "For the past ten years, Diane has fostered the growth and strength of FCNL/FCNL Education Fund among Friends and on Capitol Hill. When the General Committee approved her appointment in 2010 as the first woman to head the organization, Diane told those gathered that FCNL 'must be bold, strategic, and relentless in our advocacy.' Ten years later, in 2021, FCNL is that and far more. With gratitude to Diane for her leadership in staying true to the vision of the world we seek and to Friends' faith and practice, the Executive Committee has approved a way forward to select the next General Secretary."

FCNL hopes to bring a General Secretary candidate forward for approval during the November 2021 Annual Meeting.

Diane is a longtime friend of our Meeting and was our Quaker Forum facilitator in 2016. We hold both Diane and FCNL in the Light as they move into a new chapter!


