#### Loletta's Lines


I have been thinking about where we go when we are "sent forth to serve." Following Jesus' resurrection and forty days with the disciples, he told them to go be "witnesses in



Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8) The stories we have in the Bible indicate the eleven, plus Matthias, remained in Jerusalem. It was the convert Paul, who traveled in Anatolia and around the Aegean Sea, though Paul says Peter did make at least one visit to Antioch. At that time, "the ends" were awfully close, and "the world" was small.

We can only speculate why they initially remained in Jerusalem. Perhaps their first priority was fulfilling Jesus' words "Go not to Gentiles or Samaritans but to the lost sheep of Israel" (Matthew 10:5-6). The second was "Teach all nations... to the end of the world" (Matthew 28:19-20). From Bible stories we have, supporting the Jerusalem church and establishing orthodoxy were important issues. Perhaps even more motivation to go out came from persecution or after Paul's success. Later tradition is filled with stories about disciples traveling to the former Soviet Union, Greece, Scotland, Syria, India, Persia, Armenia, Southern Arabia, and Ethiopia. All over, to the ends of their world.

What can we learn from this? First, it seems important to start from a solid, sturdy base, and it is vitally important to have a ministry that keeps the home fires burning. Many of our committees serve the needs of our meeting. But the rest of our ministry is outward bound to the world-next door at the schools, down the street at the Soup Hour, in Whittier through the Cold Weather Shelter and Women's and Children's Crisis Shelter, in our community through the Interfaith Food Center, in our state and country through Friends Committee for Legislation California, Friends Committee on National Legislation and the American Friends Service Committee and in our world through Ramallah School, with Belize Friends, and Friends Theological College in Kenya. We are fortunate to have both inward and outward ministries here. When we stay balanced, we are faithful to Jesus' instructions to serve both our own family and go out to serve to the ends of the world.

First Friends will help celebrate Founders Day on May 6 in Central Park for fellowship and information sharing. Christian Education, Outreach, and Ministry and Counsel will all be represented and will again provide free water to our neighbors. ## A Way is Opening to Safe Space

The Spirit is leading and opening a way! Friends have had on their hearts and in their prayers a concern about the immigration system and the implementation of immigration laws.

It began with Friends who had concerns for refugees and immigrants, parents and children, strangers and friends.

In a December Meeting for Worship, Jamie Benjamin, Becky Overmyer-Velazquez and Loletta Barrett led us in a simulated refugee experience. In April, Becky and Loletta met with the Dean of Students at Whittier College to discuss working together to support students who have temporary status under Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) families and friends. Then, in Monthly Meeting we were moved to affirm a minute of safe space, with a list of potential action items for Friends to consider for the future.

The first action occurred on Maundy Thursday when Loletta and Pat were moved to participate in the Clergy and Laity United for Economic Justice (CLUE) interfaith action. The action was a walk to the Los Angeles Immigration Federal Detention Center with friends from every faith in compassionate witness against injustice. The second action followed directly after Easter, when a group of Friends (Loletta, Becky, Pat, Elisabeth Elliot, JoNita Beede, and Gwen Woirhaye, along with Jennifer Perez, another Friend and wife of the Dean), attended Know Your Rights training with the Immigration Resource Center of San Gabriel Valley, a community ministry housed at Jennifer's church Mountainside Communion Monrovia. The training provided critical information. It was eye-opening and sobering, challenging and hopeinspiring. It presented a foundation for understanding the issues that challenge the rights of everyone in our country.

Where to next? First, prayer and listening to the Spirit as to how we are to bring these issues to attention within the Meeting, discern appropriate action and share with the community around us. Where will the Spirit lead? We don't have a map, but as we step out in faith, sent forth to serve together, we know the path leads to the safe space we are called to be.

## **Eliminating Nuclear Weapons**

Carol Urner is leaving for her six months in Portland, Oregon in mid-May. She is presently working with women organizing marches globally on June 17 to welcome final negotiations of the UN treaty banning nuclear weapons. 133 nations are already involved in negotiating this historic treaty in the UN General Assembly and hope it can be ready for ratification and implementation by mid-July. The nine nuclear nations, including the United States, are resisting or openly opposing these negotiations. It is hoped that vast majority of nations can push the nuclear powers into finally eliminating these most inhumane of all weapons and thus make a long step toward general and complete disarmament. Carol is happy to share more information about this treaty, which is strongly supported globally by Pope Francis, the Catholic Church and most "mainline" Protestant churches.

before we actually hit Capitol Hill. The topic for the protecting Medicaid conference was Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), which are directly under attack by upcoming bills and will continue to be under attack under the current administration. Quickly, we realized how important speaking out on these issues was and that we could not stand by and let these lifesaving provisions be decimated.

attendance had was what exactly is a lobbyist? Lobbying has a bad reputation; as most people associate lobbyists with highly-paid corporate lobby organizations that attempt to buy votes from members of Congress. In reality, lobbying is the simple act of constituents talking to their representatives. Anyone can lobby, and it is a vital part of making sure the voices of the community are heard.

The second question we had was how exactly do we talk to our representatives? It is a fairly daunting task, and FCNL prepared us well. We spent three days preparing for our visit to Capitol Hill. We were trained on how to share stories to connect the issues to the concerns and real life experience of the constituents. We also learned about the issues and became wellversed in what Medicaid and SNAP actually do and the threats of eliminating and undermining them with block grants and per capita caps.

On the actual lobby day, I believe that every one of you would have been proud of our representation of First Friends. We met with the other Californians from all over the state and met with staffers of Senators Feinstein and Harris in the morning. In the afternoon, the four of us met with Representative Linda Sanchez' staff. My dad and I shared our story of how legislation that protects patient rights has personally saved my life. Kat shared her experience with state-funded health care and the impact on foster children. Bella took the lead on guiding the discussion with Representative Sanchez and wrote the briefing for the FCNL staff on our visit. I was so proud of these 16-year-olds for jumping right into leadership roles. I believe our stories are powerful, and the staffers responded positively and were encouraging when they promised us that their respective representatives were committed to fight for health care and food justice.

Two days after people from 40 different states lobbied their congressional representatives with FCNL, the American Health Care Act, which would have undermined Medicaid, failed to be brought to a vote. That was a major victory. Did the lobbyists make that difference? It is impossible to say for sure, but I would like to believe we were a part of that. People raising their voice to Congress to stand up for the rights of all of us made that difference, and will continue to make that difference.

Spring Lobby Weekend gave us the tools to continue to advocate and be a voice for justice in this country.


