Spring is wrapping up at Whittier Friends School, but that doesn't mean it's time to stop learning! We continue to provide full and half-day preschool for potty-trained children 2-5 years old, plus we provide weekly Summer Enrichment opportunities for children of elementary age. Summer preschool is a chance for the children to have the continuity of school routines, while getting to take part in fun activities. Summer Enrichment for elementary kids will occur on select weeks, Tuesday through Friday, from 12 to 3 pm. It is an opportunity for kids to work on educational skills in a casual, multi-age setting, while getting a chance to socialize.



At the beginning of May, Whittier Friends School held our annual Silent Auction online with an in-person performance called, "Welcome to our Castle!" Funds raised from this Spring Event surpassed Spring Event funds raised during the past two years. #### Dear Friends,

As you read this, I have safely returned from my Egypt trip, and, if God wills, (Muslims say "Inshallah" in Arabic), I am in Washington, DC as a Friend in Washington with Friends Committee on National Legislation. I am staying in the apartment upstairs from the Welcoming Center, next

door to the office, just across the street from the offices of our representatives in Congress. Here are some of the things I may do in June in support of FCNL:

- Conversations with other pastors at Friends' churches/meetings to listen to their communities' needs and how work with FCNL can support them.
- Advise and support staff in developing their ministry – approaching and orienting their work towards spiritual accompaniment.
- Connect with staff and supporters, including guests at Friends Place, around how Quaker beliefs and practices intersect with FCNL's work and develop ways to encourage encounters. One activity may be hosting Wednesday Silent Reflection and other times for gathering and speaking about the spiritual journey and connection between faith and action to staff and constituents.
- Develop a plan for groups to host hospitality hubs for the November 2023 Annual Meeting (as we did at our meeting!) to expand participation and outreach. I also hope to visit some of my favorite Smithsonian museums and perhaps a Friend or friend or two. It is all very exciting and energizing!

### A Successful Walk Around the Neighborhood

First Friends walkers were up early on Saturday, April 22nd, to support Shelter's Right Hand and the Women's and Children's Crisis Shelter! We joined with over 650 other walkers to gather at Central Park and accomplish the walk route. We enjoyed refreshments, prizes along entertainment, and contemplating displays that served as poignant reminders of our shared purpose. With the help of our donations and enthusiasm, Shelter's Right Hand raised over \$61,000 for the crisis shelter that is located nearby in our community.

First Friends walkers were also part of a larger effort to raise awareness and funds. Upon our invitation, the SELA Collaborative Group, which we have recently joined, sent several other church groups to participate in Because of our efforts, the walk. has been raised in church awareness communities around us. Thank you to all Friends who walked or made donations and continue to pray for victims of domestic violence in our community.

#### **FCNL Whittier Advocacy Team Acts**

Our newly formed Friends Committee on National Legislation Whittier Advocacy Team had three actions recently. We had an information table at the Whittier Earth Day event in tandem with a display about the First Friends solar project in 2018, and we had information at the Founders Day event in May. We also joined the recent California Team online meetings with staff at Senator Feinstein and Senator Padilla's offices in which eight teams were represented.

In addition, we scheduled a visit with Congresswoman Linda Sanchez to present the FCNL "ask" for 2023: allocation for three specific peace-building funds within the State Department and Foreign Operations Bill. These are the Complex Crises Fund, the Atrocities Prevention Fund. and the Reconciling Programs. We had a good conversation. She was supportive of peace-building, however, not very encouraging about these sorts of appropriations in today's contentious climate in Congress. We look forward to developing an ongoing relationship with Linda and her staff.



We hope to continue raising awareness about the cost-effectiveness of peace-building efforts. For example, \$1 spent in preventing violence saves \$16 in responding to violence or military spending. There also seems to be a connection with immigration: the lessening of conflict in other countries may lead to fewer people leaving to seek asylum. We are hopeful that Congress will support these kinds of programs. If you have interest in joining our advocacy efforts, please let Darrell Warren or Russ Litchfield know.



## OUR WILD PLANTS BEAUTIFUL BUT OFTEN DEADLY!

Since retirement from his first career as a neurosurgeon, Bruce Everett has developed a second absorbing occupation, as a naturalist and nature photographer. His beautiful illustrated lectures have delighted many civic and church groups in the Whittier area, including our own All Friends Fellowship Night. Bruce returned to AFFN Wednesday evening, May 10. An especially bountiful potluck supper and Bruce's latest slideshow celebrated the resumption of AFFN after nearly three years of pandemic layoff.



This time Bruce concentrated on toxic plants in the Whittier Hills. Fellowshippers were surprised at how many plants growing in our cherished open spaces are poisonous. For instance, wild hemlock, an attractive flowering bush introduced from Europe to America in the mid-1800's, is now common in the Whittier Hills. It contains a deadly alkaloid substance that, in ancient times, was used to execute prisoners, including Socrates the philosopher. It is very similar in appearance to another common plant, Queen Anne's Lace, which is used to make herbal remedies. Best not to make herbal tea without the advice of an expert like Bruce! Other toxic plants that are occasionally encountered by grazing livestock are datura ("jimson weed") and milk vetch ("locoweed"). The toxins in these plants produce hallucinations in humans and strange erratic behavior in animals.

Many herbs growing in our local hills are edible or medicinally useful. Miner's lettuce is a tasty salad ingredient. Fortunately, it is readily recognizable by its smooth round leaves. Oldtimers in California knew how to make wine from the fruit and attractive white flowers of the elderberry. The thickly-clustered red berries of the lemonberry bush, a variety of sumac, can be eaten raw or cooked. White sweet clover and yellow sweet clover are used as a diuretic and to treat stomach ulcers.

Friends expressed great appreciation to Bruce for a fine finale to a short AFFN season, which now gives way to summer picnics in the park. AFFN resumes in September.


