I got to go—actually stay—on my first "staycation." I jettisoned the stress of travel plans and I learned a lot. Making no plans can lead to spontaneity and can get you into doing a



bunch of projects-or it can lead to sitting on the porch watching the grass grow. Either one can actually be satisfying! "Retting out" (that's an old Midwestern expression for throwing out trash, cleaning, or clearing out unwanted items) makes you feel lighter. It is a good idea to plan ahead however; the recycling bin overflows, the thrift store isn't open 24 hours for donations, and stay-cations can be just as tiring as vacations! Cleaning lasts a day, but gardening lasts longer and the plants are beautiful. Quiet time alone can be soothing, with God refreshing, with Friends enlivening. Taking your time makes nourishing food taste great, and it is even better when shared. Visiting churches can be eye-opening and there are wonderful people there, too. ALL FRIENDS FELLOWSHIP NIGHT

All Friends Fellowship Night is on summer vacation and will return in the fall. Look for the September issue of The Living Light for all the details.

Rebuilding and Forgiveness

Vietnam, once the site of so much trauma for Americans, is now a most attractive tourist destination. And, best of all, the Vietnamese people, survivors and their descendants of a bitter war, are friendly and accessible, seemingly sympathetic and welcoming to Americans. Kathy Marin learned these astonishing facts on a month-long excursion last February, and shared them with a large All Friends Fellowship Night audience on June 13 in Fellowship Hall.

Kathy's hour-long slide show documented her arrival in Hanoi during the Buddhist New Year celebrations, with people warmly dressed for the chill of the foggy upland climate. Shrines and flowers everywhere emphasized the importance of New Year.

Kathy related feeling an immediate kinship with the people, and her pictures revealed a life of hard toil, yet spirited and optimistic people who receive much health care and educational support from the communist government. Kathy brought a display of some of the lovely fabrics she bought—the northern tribal peoples are renowned weavers.

Kathy's tour group worked their way southward from the Chinese border by bus and river boat through cities whose names evoke poignant memories for many Americans—Hue, DaNang and Ho Chi Minh City (formerly Saigon). In Hue, the site of fierce engagements during the Vietnam War, Kathy visited a Buddhist monastic community and the orphanage they support. The orphans are not released for adoption, but remain in the community through high school as they prepare for a life on their own. DaNang, another battleground, is now a popular visitor center featuring the remains of a 4th century Hindu temple complex.

Ho Chi Minh City is a thriving commercial city in the midst of a construction boom. Kathy's pictures showed the U. S. Embassy building from which the last American residents were evacuated by helicopter when the communists took over. A giant mural on the side of the building depicts the traumatic departure. The Embassy building is now dwarfed by neighboring skyscrapers. Kathy's tour concluded with a boat trip down the Mekong River to the delta area. This was the escape route for the "boat people," who fled the communist take-over. Many of their descendants now live in the greater Los Angeles area.

Friends gained, from Kathy's superb lecture, a new understanding of and sympathy for the Vietnamese people. The pre-lecture potluck supper arranged by Mary Marshburn with the help of the Fellowship Committee was worthy of an extraordinary travelogue.

Bella was vice president of the Liberty in Korea Club at Southlands Christian School. She'll attend the University of Redlands with the goal of becoming an OB-GYN doctor like her grandmother.

Cedric is passionate about restoring the environment, so it comes as no surprise that he'll be majoring in environmental science and resource management at Cal State Channel Islands. His dream is to become a renewable energy engineer focusing on developing a zero carbon fuel.

Wes is currently at Riverside City College, where he enjoys tutoring and mentoring. He is exploring a wealth of interests including art history, music and photography.

In the message, Bella used the example of her favorite TV show "The Fosters" to illustrate her belief that "Blood does not make family. Love does." She then thanked everyone—"whether I have known you for a day or for my entire life"—for being a part of her family.

While pondering the question of what makes a family, Kat said she had a silly thought and "instantly face-palmed because it sounded so ridiculous." The thought was—can you be your own family? She touchingly related how her own loneliness and self-deprecation gave way to trust. "The wall that surrounded me, slowly and surely, began to lower...but I still had an empty feeling. I still didn't have much confidence in who I was, no matter how many people told me that I'm strong...I appreciated the support but I needed to say these things myself and believe them too. In a sense, I needed to be my own family. Today, I am finally saying to all of you what I taught myself—by being my own family, showing your true colors, just being you, that's all you can do."

We are blessed beyond words to have such delightful young people in our Meeting. We pray you will continue to share their gifts and talents and grow in their spiritual walk answering that of God in themselves and in everyone they meet.



Remembering Vi Smith

We will all miss my mother and your friend, Vi Smith. While going through her files, we found a two-page story of her life that she wrote and asked that one of her sons read at her memorial service.

So, I'm pleased to share with you Vi's words describing her own life. I've taken the liberty of adding a few names, dates, and phrases to help us all better understand her account.

On October 3, 1921, in El Centro, California, Allen and Mae Lewis and their six-year-old son Allen Lee welcomed Violet Marie Lewis into this world. She quickly became known to all as "Vi." Her father operated large cranes and heavy construction equipment and his job often required him to work far from home often for long periods. Her mother was a homemaker and a great cook in the Southern style.

She was proud of the fact that her California heritage went back to at least 1875, when her 16-yearold grandfather moved from Missouri to the small town of Artesia in Orange County. Vi's father was born in Artesia in 1888 and the graves of many of her relatives are in a small Artesia cemetery. Vi's California connection goes back even earlier. Her great grandfather made two trips from Missouri to the Sacramento area, once in 1850 and again in 1859, traveling by ox teams and hoping to discover gold. This great grandfather died in the Civil War while serving as a Union soldier in the Missouri State Militia.

When Vi was one year old, she moved briefly to Bell and then to Huntington Park where she lived for the next 23 years. She attended elementary school, junior high, and high school there, graduating in 1940 from Huntington Park High School. That same year, in December, she met Charles William Smith, or "Charlie" as he was known to all. Charlie was also a native Californian, born in Los Angeles in 1915. Five months after Vi and Charlie met, they were married in Las Vegas, Nevada. Their marriage lasted 57 years until his sudden death in February 1998.

Together they had three sons. Charles Allen

(Chuck), born in 1942 in Bell; Richard Harold, born in 1945 in South Gate, and Jack Lee, born on New Year's Day 1947 in Whittier. In 1946, Vi and Charlie bought a new home in Montebello. In raising three sons, Vi became active in PTA and Boy Scouts, acting as a Cub Scout den mother.

The 1950's and 60's were busy years for the family. They went to San Diego often to see grandparents. Vi and Charlie enjoyed sharing hobbies with their three sons. Charlie—known for his ability to build, repair, or remodel almost anything—built two tear-drop trailers in 1947 and camping and traveling became a hobby the whole family enjoyed. The boys loved fishing and camping with their friends and all three learned to swim in Bass Lake near Yosemite National Park.

Charlie loved baseball and the family spent many nights watching Charlie play for the Thermador Electric Company team. Charlie encouraged Richard and Jack to play baseball as children and enjoyed practicing with them.

Charlie and Vi had their own hobbies. They loved square and round dancing as well as playing cards, especially pinochle, with their friends.

In 1959, Vi decided to go to work. She started as an account clerk in the accounts payable department at the Montebello Unified School District office. She worked there for 25 years and made many wonderful friends. She still saw them at monthly luncheon gettogethers and an annual retirement potluck gathering for all the retirees of the school district.

In 1968, after their three sons had graduated from high school, Charlie and Vi bought a new home in Hacienda Heights where they lived for 28 years. In 1980, after 45 years with Thermador, Charlie retired. Three years later, Vi retired. Almost immediately, they bought a motor home and began traveling. In the following years, they traveled to all 50 states and much of Canada. In addition, they enjoyed traveling and cruising to many foreign countries.

In 1986, Vi became interested in genealogy and began many years researching her family tree. She was proud to become a member of the John Greenleaf Whittier chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Whittier Area Daughters of the Golden West Genealogy Society.

In 1996, Vi and Charlie bought a home in Whittier. When they lived there, they began attending First Friends, a source of much happiness and comfort to Vi.
