Loletta's Lines

I have been reading "Four Thousand Weeks; Time Management for Mortals" by Oliver Burkeman. Although Burkeman has an easy, pleasant writing style, it is not an easy read. He challenges all the time management



techniques I have tried: like making "smart" lists, strategic goal setting, and A, B, C priorities. When I was an emergency manager, projects kept being added exponentially, especially in between ongoing disaster response, recovery projects, and preparation for the next "big one." It became impossible to prioritize so I asked the sheriff, "Which projects do you want us to do and when?" His answer was, "All of them. Now." His time management advice was not helpful.

Burkeman says the problem is that time management misses out on the biggest piece of the puzzle. It is not reality. I developed some queries from this. If you applied every efficiency measure, could you do more than you can do? Can you add two hours to your day? Does your irritation at how long it takes to boil water for pasta make it boil faster? Can you make popcorn finish popping by removing it from the microwave 30 seconds early? If we hurry up to complete projects so we can hurry up to complete projects, do we even know what projects we are completing? If we work to gain wealth or possessions but do not enjoy them, are they "real"? If we deny ourselves fun and adventure now to save for retirement, will we enjoy them more then than we would now? If what I am doing now is my choice, and I am not happy with what I am doing, do I get that time back later?

Summer is here, but it will soon be over. We need to cram in every bit of fun, picnics, sunsets, walks in the park, and vacations we can. We need to hurry up to enjoy it and relax! I need to hurry up and finish Burkeman's book so I can loan it to you.

But that would negate his whole purpose! And I think Jesus would approve paraphrasing him. Can any of you by hurrying, making lists, or becoming an efficiency expert on your life add

Summer, Stops, and September

July and August bring the end of the choir season (section leaders this year) and the opportunity to shift our music for other expressions, including



organ or piano selections or vocal solos. This year, I am planning to work on some more significant organ repertoire for Sundays: my list includes *Litanies* by Jehan Alain, a Prelude and Fugue by J.S. Bach, a Felix Mendelssohn piece, a couple of works by Cesar Franck, *Suite Medievale* by Jean Langlais, and a classical French work that uses the "Grands Jeux" (a combination of reed stops).

Another project that I have been contemplating is to record a sort of blog talking about and demonstrating various organ stops that are found in our Harris organ. Our organ has a wealth of color and it might be interesting for you to hear and see individual ranks of pipes and learn more about them and how they are used. If this comes together well, I will post my recordings on YouTube and provide you with a link in our weekly e-news.

I am not completely certain when we will be able to reactivate the Friends Choir in the fall, but I am feeling led to start planning for it. I want to get feedback from the Music Committee as well as former and potential choir members to determine protocols, interest, and develop a schedule. Please pray for discernment about the direction we should take. If you have interest in singing in the Friends Choir, please let me know.

I hope you have a relaxing but Spirit-filled summer. As opportunities arise for hymn-singing this summer, please join in with confidence. Thank you for your continued support of our Music Ministry.

Friends Service Committee community garden, ushering and facilitating technology in the meetinghouse, and contributing to leading Understanding Through Sharing group discussions.



Stoking the Fire - Your Life a Candle, This Day a Match

This year's STF retreat was a hybrid meeting with 36 Friends across the country. Four images of candles were provided. A new candle with a burning match just ready to light an untouched wick. A candle burning brightly in the darkness. A bright flaming wick in a remnant pool of wax. A candle with a wick giving off more smoke than flame. Which image reflects the state of your soul?

The retreat included worship in music, presentations by several Friends, break-out groups to allow discussion of queries, a time of service or reflection on our own, and a choice of workshops. Workshops included Faithful Meetings, Embodying the Good News, and Exploring Eldering as Spiritual Nurture. The latter was especially interesting; allowing exploration of the difference between eldering and being a Weighty Friend, and the responsibility of all Friends to grow and develop skills and offer gentle spiritual and emotional encouragement, insight, and support as elders to all other Friends.

Nate Macy, pastor of Worship at North Valley Friends in Newberg, Oregon led worship in music with his guitar and singing. Lisa McMinn is a Spiritual Director and Writer- in-Residence at George Fox University. She gave the group resources for prayer which can refill our candles, center our flames, and guide us in where to shine the Light. Pam and Ron Ferguson, co-pastors at Winchester Friends, Indiana, have ministered together for decades. They shared their insights about how their ministry has remained strong for many years; God, each other, and the example and support of amazing Friends they served with in Africa through civil wars, and in the US through outreach to the community in food pantry and visiting people in prison. Sussie Ndanyi, an M.Div. student at Earlham School of Religion served as the first female Administrative Secretary of Friends Church Nairobi Yearly Meeting in Kenya and has extensive experience in ecumenical settings. She has been grounded spiritually by the United Society of Friends Women.

It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia Part 2

A report from Friends Council on Education Continued from the June issue of The Living Light

In the afternoon of the first day of the gathering, we got to rejoin with the Heads and went on a walking tour of Philadelphia, led by Jenn, the history expert at Arch Street Meeting House. She was a wealth of knowledge as she told us about the grounds' history, first as a burial ground given to the Quakers by William Penn, and then built as the largest meetinghouse of its time (it's still a very large meetinghouse!). Throughout her tour, she discussed the paradox of Quaker history in Philadelphia, such as Quakers who owned slaves but fought for equality, or Sarah Mae Douglas, an attender of Arch St. Meetinghouse in the early 1800s who wasn't allowed to be a member because she was black. After the tour, we had a dinner that was just Heads of Friends Schools (and Lea and Hudson).

The next morning, the Gathering continued, with announcements of upcoming FCE business that pertains to Heads, such as workshops that FCE leads (Parent Workshops, Educators New to Quakerism Workshops, etc), and a guick overview of the Committees that make up FCE (Membership, Finance, Development, Governance, etc). There was a brief discussion about Membership Renewal and the SPARC (Spirited Practice and Renewed Purpose) program.

Then we split into two groups by school size (I was in the "less than 200" group), where we had some time to talk about hot topics. Topics discussed included:

- · Re-kindling Community and Quaker Life (ie. Meeting for Worship in school) Post-pandemic world.
- · Creating Culture of Belonging for students and families who are minorities (specifically students of color, LGBTQ, and those with Learning Differences).
- Scholarships/financial aid that the various schools offer.
- · Recruiting Staff and Students (the topic I brought up), and retention.

Finally, we ended the 24-hour event with another session of Meeting for Worship, this time in the historic Arch Street Meetinghouse's "Monthly

Meeting for Business" room, which was a more intimate room that is used for their Meetings for Business.

It was so helpful to see FCE in action, to hear about their programs in person. Since the pandemic, FCE has been dedicated to making meetings more accessible to people who are not in the general area of Philadelphia, so now more than ever it is easier to take part and be involved. Several people from larger schools made an effort to greet me personally while I was there, and Drew Smith (Executive Director) and Deborra Sines Pancoe (Associate Director) also really made sure that I felt at home, even though it was my first gathering, and we are such a small and seemingly insignificant school.

It was also so refreshing to touch bases with other educators who also find value in the same things we do, such as equality, peace, and community, with а similar open-ended, child-centered approach to curriculum and learning that we do. I could see our own school community mirrored in these other school communities, as I heard these heads talk about their own schools. We look forward to continuing to be in contact with, and be inspired by, these other schools and their leaders.
