News from Whittier Friends School



Whittier Friends School wrapped up the school year with two field trips and two meetings for recognition. Our first trip, on May 31, was to the Bailey House, the home of Whit-

tier's - and First Friends Church's - founders, Jonathan and Rebecca Bailey. Fourteen children and 11 adults attended this special trip, including Whittier Friends School Committee Clerk Candice Ryder and First Friends Church Pastor Loletta Barret. On this trip, the children got a hands - on chance to try some 1880's chores, such as scrubbing and wringing out laundry and grinding corn; plus they got to try some oldfashioned children's games like Jacob's Ladder and jump rope. They also got a chance to tour the old ranch house, seeing the furniture, photos, and curiosities of the Baileys and their descendents. The children were eager to inform the docents that the original bench from the porch of the Bailey House is in the room where their class meets for chapel every week!

The final WFS field trip for the year was our annual trip to Mother's Beach in Marine Park, Long Beach. It was a joy having 12 elementary children attend, plus 4 preschool students, 1 former student, 2 siblings, and 14 adults in attendance. Though it was very chilly (Thank you, June Gloom!), the children enjoyed their antics in the water, and the parents enjoyed conversations with each other.

Whittier Friends School Elementary held their Meeting for Recognition on Wednesday,

June 12. The children sang "You've Got a Friend in Me" (From *Toy Story*), "Try Everything" (from *Zootopia*), and "When Can I See You Again?" (from *Wreck - it Ralph*). Younger children read motivational quotes from Disney movies while older children read some of their favorite excerpts from the novels they read in class, such as *Tuck Everlasting* and *Sarah*, *Plain and Tall*. Besides recognizing staff, donors, parents, and the School Committee, the children also recognized each other with awards they helped choose. These awards gave them a chance to celebrate the unique gifts they recognize in their classmates.

WFS Preschool's Graduation was on Friday, June 21, with 10 graduates honored. Though some of these children will go on to public school, we are pleased that a few will stick around with us in our TK/Kindergarten program. The children sang "A Tooty Ta" and "My Itsy Bitsy Preschool," and like the Elementary students, all children – even those not graduating yet – received certificates recognizing a unique quality they exhibit. At Whittier Friends School, we celebrate not just the accomplishments of our children, but also their individuality. What a special group of students we have grown to care about this year!

We continue enrollment for the elementary 2024-2025 school year, as well as our Elementary Summer Enrichment Program, which will occur from June 24 through August 8. Weekly summer enrichment themes will include such topics as Ocean, Zoo, and Fairy Tales. Families can sign up for whichever weeks they are interested in attending. O Love That Will Not Let Us Go! We are deeply moved by the love and moral support from our dear Whittier Friends. Leaving them was a great wrench, softened by the knowledge

that we still belong.

We are getting used to the extravagant greenery of this area. We didn't realize before moving what a beautiful place this is. Friends Home is a community of about 400, about half

Quakers. There is an extensive woodland with a small river bordering the residence, with a vast meadow/pasture beyond. The Sandy Spring Meeting House is about a mile away, accessible by road or rustic trail. Halfway to the Meeting House is the Sandy Spring - a little puddle at the bottom of a hollow. A sign at the spring says it was a stopping point on the Underground Railroad.

We have been to Meeting for Worship twice. Our first visit brought two surprises. Meghan Roush, our regular attender from Whittier College, was present and I recognized her (and vice versa). Turns out she is from Sandy Spring her folks are stalwart members here. Tom Taylor from Ann Arbor, MI, introduced himself. Tom brought a memorable October celebration event to First Friends several years ago. He introduced us to the Swahili hymn Mungo Pendo which Russ followed up on several times at Meeting.

The cute little town of Olney is only three miles away. Our car arrived a week after we got here. I still have to get a Maryland drivers' license. Olney has everything - two huge markets rivaling Ralph's, Bank of America, State Farm, a complete-care medical center. Our son Ben lives 20 miles away in Columbus. He helped us greatly to get relocated.

The residents here are very friendly - several have taken special interest in making us feel welcome. There are lots of special events -outdoor suppers, movies, sing-along evenings, a small Sunday worship group, and Midweek Meeting for Worship.

I was especially touched that you earmarked some of your last Peace Café contributions to Right Sharing in honor of us. That must have pleased Jackie Stillwell - she counts on Whittier Friends for continued support. She wrote us a personal thank you.

We feel the love of our California Friends from 3000 miles away!

Peace Cafe Returns in Person

On Saturday, May 25, the return of the first live Peace Cafe since the pandemic pause, was a resounding success by all accounts. Over 60 people attended the evening held in Fellowship Hall filled with music, poetry, stories, food, and crafts, and over \$500 was raised (after covering basic expenses) in order to support this year's Peace Day Festival - a kid's event to be held on July 20 at FFC. This year, in addition to First Friends participants, friends, family, and those from the community, we were joined and supported by many from the Mission Collaborative Group.

Jo Nita Beede coordinated the "open-mic" entertainment program. The talented musical performances included lively ukulele pieces by "Susie Q and the Vagrant" and by Cynthia. There was a contemplative flute recital by Mike Whitehorse, and guitar with vocal sets were performed by several musicians - Johnny Hendricks, Laurie Falter, Holly Overin, Jo Nita Beede, and Mark Moran. The Woirhaye family sang a Tongva song accompanied by Mike Whitehorse on the native flute, and Deanna sang a Tongva song a capella. Russ Litchfield taught and led the audience in a round of "Da Pacem Cordium" ("Give Peace to Every Heart").

Poetry reciters included Lyn Mulligan with three poems from her recently published book, Loletta Barrett with an original, and Elisabeth Elliot from Walt Whitman. George Lopez, a local published author, read one of his stories, and one of the crafters, Helen, told her personal narrative of how she recovered from trauma during the pandemic by making 1,000 paper cranes. Pastor Loletta poignantly shared how Bob Newton, who recently moved with his wife to Maryand, had for years supported Right Sharing of World Resources at Peace Cafe by selling trinkets that he had found on his infamous hikes. Jo Nita also read audience responses to queries on the tables asking about their own personal thoughts and 6 experiences regarding peace.



Crafters included Helen, who sold her handmade jewelry in addition to her paper crane creations, Barbara Covell with hand-sewn creations, and Barbara's husband, Bill, with his uniquely hand-crafted premium writing pens. Holly brought her mother's (Janet Church) original artwork, and Deanna offered a beautiful array of greeting cards featuring her own original photography as well as handmade jewelry by her father, Jerry. Additionally, Russ Litchfield manned a table with information about FCNL and Right Sharing of World Resources.

Many thanks go to all who attended, performed, participated, and volunteered. Special recognition goes to Carrin Bouchard for planning the menu, George Bouchard for working the sound system, Marilyn Fant, Candice Ryder, and Loletta Barrett for their work in the kitchen, Ashley Ryder for being greeter, and to Jo Nita Beede for her work in promoting and organizing the event. Thank you, also, to Elyse Woirhaye for creating the promotional poster, and to Bose Robinson for sharing her marketing and styling talents. Many thanks, also, to members of the Mission Collaborative for their loving and generous support.


