#### **Compassionate Communication**

In October, Friends traveled to Dana Point for the biennial All-Meeting Retreat. Led by Jim Higginbotham, associate professor of pastoral care at Earlham School of Religion, the Retreat was an inspiring time of profound and challenging questioning, honest and open conversation and, most of all, deep worship. The following is the first in a series of reflections of our weekend of "Compassionate Communication."

Communication is a really big subject. Every day, it seems to encompass more as technology expands our ways of talking to one another. But are we truly "communicating?" The varied apparatuses and lightning pace that embodies interaction today is, one has to admit, lacking. What should be more efficient is actually slowing us down.

The Friends Choir will present three musical works on Music Sunday at Meeting for Worship on November 6.

Te Deum laudamus (We Praise Thee, O God) is one of the oldest non-Biblical Christian texts. Richard Proulx's setting uses a translation by John Dryden that differs from the usual liturgical translation. Proulx uses melodic material from the traditional Gregorian chant melody associated with Te Deum. The choir will be accompanied by handbells.

Rejoice In the Lamb by Benjamin Britten was commissioned for the 50th anniversary of St. Matthew's Church in Northampton in 1943. Britten chose excerpts from "Jubilate Agno," a long poem composed by Christopher Smart in a mental asylum where he was committed for apparent religious mania. Smart's poem depicts idiosyncratic praise and worship of God by all created beings and things, each in its own way. The cantata is divided into eight sections, according to the divisions of the selected texts. The choir and soloists will be accompanied by the organ.

Psalm 150 is all about the praise of God in music. Belgian-born composer César Franck was known as a great organ improviser and travelled widely to demonstrate new instruments built by innovative organ builder, Aristide Cavaillé-Coll. Franck served Sainte-Clotilde in Paris, where he played an important Cavaille -Coll organ. Psaume 150, originally for mixed chorus, orchestra and organ, was written for the Institute of Young Blind People in Paris to introduce their new organ to the public in 1884.

Let everything that has breath praise God.

*Friends About Town:* The Whittier Historic Neighborhood Association included several homes connected with Whittier's Quaker history on its 2016 Home Tour on October 15. Carina Sass helped organize the tour, and some members of First Friends were tour workers. At 6727 Painter Avenue, docents, including Laura Torres, showed people through the recently renovated home that was built in 1905 as a parsonage for First Friends. It was here, in 1940, when Herschel Folger was pastor, that Esther & Carl Nelson were married. Dan Wright, who created some of the (new) stained glass windows in the house, displayed his antique Model T Ford in front and was on hand to discuss cars with visitors. At 7332 College Avenue, tour guests were shown through the Craftsman home of Alpha Overin's in-laws, Joseph (J.A.) & Leona McGee. Alpha helped lead a successful neighborhood effort in 2003 to get their hilltop house declared historical, saving it from demolition by a developer. Also on the Home Tour were the historic Bailey House at 13421 Camilla Street, home of Whittier's first Quaker settlers, Jonathan & Rebecca Bailey, and the home at 6211 Painter Avenue built in 1907 by their son, Edward Bailey. our early parsonage with Dan's model T out front. **Milt Wright** drove his 1931 Chevrolet sedan to the annual Vintage Chevrolet Club of America "All Chevy Show" in Tustin.

"Take it to the Lord in prayer." In the hymn "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," the lyricist Joseph Scriven advises us to take our cares to God in prayer. Take everything: trials and



temptations, troubles, cares, loss of friends, sorrows and weaknesses, and find peace there. The hymn is based on James 5:13. The first part of the verse reads, "Are any among you suffering? They should pray..." It is a lovely song and I have found comfort in it, and in prayer.

Lately I have been taking our country and our world to God in prayer, much more than any personal concerns. There are many things going on in our country and world that we can be concerned about. I was reminded by one of our young Friends that we do not have the power to change them, but we do have the power to make the world a better place for one other person. And therein begins hope, especially when Friends join together. Many of us have seen the quote from Margaret Mead, the American anthropologist: "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

At the very root of communication is storytelling, the ancient art of passing along our narrative. Perhaps the greatest gift of the Retreat was the mix of generations contributing to the mix. What a joy to participate in dialogue seasoned with the perspectives of all ages!

The ritual of beginning any session with the "tell us a little bit about yourself' is pretty much a cliché. Or so we thought. In addition, we were asked to share a time when we felt that we were truly heard by another person. The dynamics of the group brought this opening sharing to a new level, as our individual personalities came to the surface rather quickly. As members of our meeting, don't we already know each other pretty well? As we talked, the answer went from "sure!" to "well, maybe not..." Surprise!

Joanne Camp shared one of the best examples of what it is to be truly heard, as her late husband Ken was, everyone agreed, among the very best of listeners. Ken's presence was felt keenly-a true instance of loving communication being passed on.

Clear and present listening is a challenge. As Friends, service and worship go hand in hand. But how many times do we find ourselves simply fulfilling an immediate need without putting effort into understanding that need and offering more than a physical act? When someone has a flat tire, for instance, isn't it easier to just change the tire and then go on our way? It is true that faith without works is dead (James 2:14) but how about the other way around? How do we express our faith through listening? Which is harder: the hearing or the helping?
