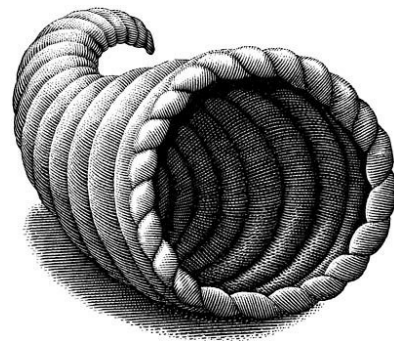

News from Whittier Friends School

Our students, staff, and families worshipped with the Meeting at Whittier Friends School Sunday on October 18. The theme was "Love," and focused on Ephesians 4:2-3—"Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace."

Candice Ryder, school committee clerk, gave an uplifting message about the importance of God's love in our lives, admitting that it is natural to have "big feelings" like selfishness or impatience, but that God's love can help. The meeting for worship also included the elementary children's own reflections on their ideas about love. They talked about being loved by and loving their family, how love connects them to other people, and how it can be challenging to be apart from the people they love during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Some of the children shared their ideas while wearing face coverings, a physical reminder of the pandemic, and reinforcing our community's strict adherence to guidelines that keep each other safe.

Our loving staff continues to provide emotional and academic support in person at our daily "Homework Camp." Our elementary students can attend each morning to get extra help with assignments. Though we, along with all other schools in our county, are unable to offer our full academic day, we continue to offer all that we can.

Field trips look different also, from a video of a bat rescue facility in Australia to a masked walk near Central Park to see a giant skeleton decorating a neighbor's yard for Halloween—we are learning about human biology this year, after all!

Russ' Reflections

The Music of Advent

I think that Advent is my favorite season for hymns and other church music.

Advent is the beginning of the church year cycle. The themes of Advent include hope and expectation, prophecy, peace, and proclamation, love and justice, joy and service.

Advent is a time of preparation, for taking action: Getting ready for winter, decorating and cooking for family gatherings, for giving gifts, and for the celebration of Jesus' birth, God's gift to us. When we introduce Christmas songs too early in the season, we tend to miss these themes and the opportunities for spiritual work that can deepen our holiday celebrations.

Some of my favorite Advent hymns are Martin Luther's reworking of St. Ambrose's hymn, *Savior of the Nations, Come*, that alludes to the mystical nature of God's Son, the Word, born in Mary's womb; *Wake, Awake, for Night is Flying*, referring to Matthew 25:1-13 and being prepared for the coming of the Bridegroom; Charles Wesley's hymn, *Lo! He Comes with Clouds Descending*, connecting us with Jesus' sacrifice, resurrection, and coming again in majesty; *Comfort, Comfort Ye My People*, Johann Olearius' hymn, translated by Catherine Winkworth, recalling the prophecy of Isaiah 40:1-5, referred to by John the Baptist, heralding the coming of Christ; *Hark, A Thrilling Voice is Sounding*, where we are admonished to abandon darkness and take on the light of Jesus; *People, Look East, the Time is Near*, Eleanor Farjeon's hymn about getting ready, for "Love, the Guest, the Rose, the Star, the Lord is on the Way."

As Alberto Taulé, translated by Madeleine Forell Marshall, in a recent Advent hymn expresses: "All earth is hopeful, the Savior comes at last! Furrows lie open for God's creative task: this, the labor of people who struggle to see how God's truth and justice set everybody free...We first saw Jesus, a baby in a crib. This same Lord Jesus today has come to live in our world; he is present, in neighbors we see our Jesus is with us and ever sets us free." May your Advent season be deep and rich in Spirit and song, and in action.

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Vanessa Julye to Bring Message on November 22

Author and Coordinator of the Friends General Conference's

Ministry on Racism program, Vanessa Julye, will be with us on Sunday, November 22, to bring the message during Meeting for Worship.

Vanessa is a graduate of Westtown School currently working on increasing awareness of racism in the Quaker and sectarian communities. She is a co-author of "Fit for Freedom, Not for Friendship: Quakers, African Americans and the Myth of Racial Justice" and a member of Central Philadelphia Monthly Meeting.



Like most Friends organizations, our Meeting is not hierarchical in its structure, but is organized for the members and attenders themselves, who follow the Quaker process to do their work.

The Monthly Meeting has established committees to perform different roles within the church community, and members and attenders are called to serve in those committee positions, usually making a commitment for one year at a time. In the coming months, *The Living Light* will offer an overview of committees to inspire you to seek God's guidance as to where you are called to serve the meeting.

One of the distinctions in the Religious Society of Friends is the process of doing business. Individual church communities, including First Friends, meet monthly to consider the business and activity of the Meeting. The official name for this meeting is "Meeting for Worship With a Concern for Business." This gives us a clue about our process: that when considering matters or making decisions, we do so in the manner of worship, listening for God's leading at all times. The clerk listens for and helps us discern the sense of the meeting, which is not just consensus but the sense that God is present in the actions taken. Some matters are easy to discern. Others can take multiple discussions before decisions can be made.

Traditionally, lunch is served prior to Monthly Meeting, which is held following Meeting for Worship on the second Sunday of each month (currently via Zoom—bring your own lunch!). It is important that members attend Monthly Meeting to share multiple perspectives and to listen for God's leading for our Meeting.

World Quaker Day Celebrated across the Time Zones

Meeting for Worship on World Quaker Day, October 4, was the biggest celebration in the history of the Meeting thanks to global online conferencing.

We even made the Friends United Meeting newsletter! Here's the FUM write-up:

The first Sunday in October has come to be known as "World Quaker Day." Sponsored by Friends World Committee for Consultation, this day provides a focus for Friends everywhere to celebrate their kinship with the worldwide body of Friends, and to share the Quaker message with their communities.

In this year of COVID closures and isolation, World Quaker Day could have been a time of lament. However, many Meetings found new energy in creative uses of technology to bridge the distances and bring Friends together who might otherwise never have a chance to meet face to face.

Several of our FUM staff members participated in a special World Quaker Day meeting for worship hosted by Whittier First Friends Church in Whittier, California. Well over 100 households connected on Zoom from Whittier, West Richmond Friends Meeting in Richmond, Indiana; and Berkeley Friends Church in Berkeley, California. Getry Agizah, Coordinator of Friends Church Peace Team in Kenya, gave a message on "Resilience and Faith," drawing on the metaphor of the full armor of God in Ephesians 6. The Meeting was also joined by the Holland family from Belize, as well as Friends in Mexico, Germany and the United Kingdom.

In the group, we have been discussing Palmer's thoughts, attitudes, values, and approach to the apparent incongruities of life. As Palmer discovered, contradictions that are embraced and lived in are more often than not transformed into paradoxes that lead one into the deep realities of the soul where our own truth can be found, embraced, and lived.

For instance, consider these contradictions and paradoxes of scarcity and abundance, action and contemplation, liability and giftedness, and solitude and community.

How do you grapple with contradictory realities? Do you feel the need to need to resolve all contradictions?
