## **What We Did Last Summer**

At the end of our summer worship season, a survey was provided to get feedback from worshippers about the various experiences brought to us during July and August by the group of people who attended the Friends United Meeting "Stoking the Fire" Conference in Ohio in May. Responses about specific aspects were primarily positive, with responders saying they liked the silence before worship and liked meeting in Fellowship Hall as well as the spoken messages. Other aspects that had favorable marks were visual images, new songs, experiential exercises, Taizé music, the sound system and familiar hymns. The most favored seating arrangement was the U-shape, but the diamond shape was also liked. The least liked aspects were sitting and interacting in small groups and the use of a labyrinth.

Comments were diverse but mostly positive. People liked sitting in the round, the silence, praying in other languages, feeling closer as a community, chanting and watching new leadership emerge. Several people did not like the 10 a.m. worship time.

Most all of the responders agreed that we should continue having worship in these ways during future summers.

"The money has never been enough to save anyone, but every day we notice that jingling in our pockets and purses, and we think about all the people we might be able to help." It is a simple sentiment expressed in Whittier Friends School's Christmas play, *The Christmas Jars*, but one full of hope. Our school children have explored ways a little bit can do a lot of help while practicing this play, to be performed at the Family Christmas Dinner on Sunday December 13 with the church Sunday School children, and again with the Preschool on Wednesday, December 16 in conjunction with a school potluck.

The school children have also spent November thinking about helping others as they worked to complete their "Count your Blessings" calendar, which asked them to find all the blessings in their daily life. The children will use the coins and dollars they collected to purchase items requested by the Interfaith Food Center, as a way of understanding just how much can be bought when people collect a few coins here and there. We will have a picture and a count of money raised in the January issue of *The Living Light*.

Just as the months of October and November brought Whittier Friends School students a chance to give from their heart, school supporters were also given chances to give from the heart. The Chili Cookoff and Nut & Candy Sale, both annual fundraisers, did much to support the programs of our school. And our "Gift of Giving" campaign was also well-received. This campaign urged people to purchase holiday gifts through options such as the holiday boutique, a Jamberry Nails fundraiser put on by Lea Wright and Cassie Caringella, an Usborne Books fundraiser, and increased sales of scrip gift cards. # Remembering William Harrison Wright, Jr.

Bill Wright, who died at his home in Whittier on October 11, was born on October 26, 1927 to William Harrison Wright and Clara Johnson Wright in Salem OR, where his Wright grandparents were members of the S. Salem Friends Church. His brother Milton, who grew up "almost a twin" arrived thirteen months later. Milton said he and Bill had played, worked, prayed and stayed together and never disagreed to the point of harsh words

The family moved east when the boys were 3 and 4 so their father could attend Westminster Choir College. After receiving his Master of Music degree, their father served a variety of churches in the Philadelphia area and Rhode Island before returning to Oregon. The Wrights then moved to California and attended L.A.'s Temple Baptist Church.

When their father took a position teaching vocal music at Whittier College and also became Minister of Music at First Friends, the family found Whittier a good fit. Their father died an early death, but the boys and their mother, who lived to 103 as Clara Wright Woodard, put down roots.

While Marygene Marshburn was away at Friends Boarding School in Ohio, Whittier friends began writing her about the Wright boys who were new to Whittier and to First Friends. She and Bill met during their senior year at Whittier High School and began dating at Whittier College the next fall.

Early in their marriage, Bill and Marygene lived in Oregon, where Jeananne was born. William Howard arrived after they returned to Whittier, where Bill finished his BA and got his teaching credential at Whittier College. Lea and Norman were born while he was a classroom teacher and they added Kirk and Betsy after he began his 34 years with the Rowland Unified School District in which he became an administrator. Bill earned his MA in Counseling and Guidance from Cal State L.A., a School Psychologist credential from Claremont Graduate School, and an EdD in Educational Psychology from USC.

Bill was involved in many professional and community organizations, taught courses as an adjunct professor at seven colleges and universities and supervised graduate students in completing their field work.

Among Bill's volunteer efforts in Whittier were chairing the founding board of the Interchurch Counseling Center, and co-chairing with Marygene both the Library's annual Whittier Reads program and the Friends of the Shannon Center board.

First Friends Church was an important part of Bill's life for more than 70 years. He served on and chaired many committees and boards, as well as teaching Sunday School and serving with Marygene as a youth group sponsor. During the 1960s, he was a draft counselor. In recent years, he and Gwen Woirhaye co-led the Monday afternoon memoir-writing group.

Bill and Jim Cradler co-founded the Western Association of the Religious Society of Friends (WARSF). Bill was also involved with the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) and the Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC). Bill urged Deanna Woirhaye to attend the 2012 Friends World Conference in Kenya, where she was impressed by the number of people she met who knew Bill Wright. Jasmine Sturr was grateful that he had encouraged her participation in the Quaker Youth Pilgrimage to England, a life-changing event. When Eden Grace of the Friends United Meeting (FUM) staff visited from Indiana in October, she called Bill a beloved member of the Society of Friends whose life "touched Friends in many places."

The memorial service, held at First Friends on October 18, opened most movingly with a recording of Bill's father singing "Abide With Me". All of Bill's surviving children--Jeananne of Whittier, Lea of Riverside, Norman from CT, Kirk from OR, and Betsy from TX—were in Whittier when Bill passed away. Memories of their father shared in the memorial service included that he had exemplified patience and persistence, been a lifelong learner, and made you want to excel. As parents he and Marygene had modeled a good marriage and seldom given unasked-for advice. Also taking part in the service, in addition to family, were Loletta Barrett, Lynda Ladwig, Russ Litchfield, and Allison Coop who sang "Shall We Gather At The River".

#### A Disney Education in the Arts

There are many aspects of Disneyland that the millions of visitors to the Magic Kingdom know little about. We at First Friends are fortunate to have a greater appreciation of this, thanks to Disneyland Cast Members Elisabeth and Michael Elliot. On several All Friends Fellowship Nights, they have taken us on fascinating virtual excursions into their workplace.

Michael is a lighting technician and designer. At a previous AFFN event, he told us about his trips to Hong Kong for the construction of their Disneyland. This time, he brought news about the local Disneyland (insofar as he has liberty to divulge at the present time). The major upcoming attraction is a Star Wars-themed land, the addition of which is necessitating extensive changes in the physical structure of the Disney property.



Elisabeth is a coordinator for the Disney Performing Arts program, which hosts music, dance and drama groups from all over the world in the "backstage" arts program. As on previous AFFN occasions, Elisabeth brought a few of her talented colleagues to discuss their work.

Matt Takahashi works for the Youth Education Series, providing educational seminars in various fields, including leadership, science, business and animation history. These are all hands-on workshops in which school-age participants gain practical experience. An example is the construction of a model roller coaster, an exciting exercise that takes place at Disney California Adventure.

Homa Moheimani and Whitney Urian are also coordinators with the Disney Performing Arts program. Homa's educational background is business administration, but after a first experience working for Disney, she discovered her talent for working with young people. As with all the coordinators, she combines personal counseling with management skills. Whitney is a facilitator of the Music 101 workshop, which takes young musicians on a musical tour of the Park.

Jonathan Hughes described other workshops offered by the program that feature world-class clinicians coaching in music and theatre performance and production. Interestingly, Jonathan's father, David Hughes, lived with Ted and Mary Marshburn while he was a student at Whittier College, and his children have become honorary Marshburn grandchildren.

The Cast Members' enthusiasm for helping careeroriented young people enjoy and profit from practical experience was evident in their animated discussions. They gave Friends new insight into valuable contributions to education being made behind the Disneyland facades.

A superb potluck supper featuring pre-Thanksgiving turkey-and-dressing, mashed potatoes and baked homegrown argonaut squash was assembled by Mary Marshburn in honor of our talented visitors.

# Cold Weather Shelter Seeks Helpers

Every winter from November until March, the Whittier Area Interfaith Council sponsors a Cold Weather Shelter to provide overnight hospitality for some of the homeless in our Whittier community.

In January, we will coordinate with our friends and neighbors at First United Methodist Church to house and feed up to forty homeless people. FUMC is graciously opening their doors from Monday evening, January 4<sup>th</sup> until Monday morning, January 18<sup>th</sup>. They will provide an accessible location for dinner and sleeping and our meeting is pitching in with a portion of the meals and supervision.

The Methodist Church has designated a lead cook who will plan the meals so that volunteers can easily arrive at 6 p.m. each evening and prepare the dinner meal. There is a need for supervisors (one male, one female) to host from 6 p.m. to midnight each night and also from midnight until 7 a.m. each morning. Coffee and a hot breakfast are also provided.

Our participation is being organized through the cooperation of the Outreach and Christian Education committees. Sign-up sheets will be available in Founders Court as we begin to seek volunteers to help with cooking dinners, hosting, and overnight supervision.

Please consider that you might start the new year as a volunteer offering this valuable service. Then let us join together with our Methodist friends to warm our hands and our hearts at the Cold Weather Shelter in January!
