But there are approximately 300 other individuals and families for whom there is "no room in the inn." Last year the Interfaith Council was also led to respond to the new and growing need for overnight lodging for families with children in hotels.

Decorate the tree with new socks, gloves, and hats. Put new blankets, jackets, umbrellas, and rain ponchos under the tree. Add a \$\$ gift to the gift box by cash, check or gift card. All the decorations and gifts will be given to the St. Matthias Soup hour to minister to our neighbors living on the streets. The financial gifts will go to the Interfaith Council for the fund for housing families. Share the warmth; share the Peace!

Colin presented an illustrated summary of FUM mission activities in Kenya, Palestine and Belize, projects of which First Friends have been active supporters for many years, to complete a memorable Outreach Sunday.



Friends Transported by Pictures and Music

An extraordinary artistic event occurred at All Friends Fellowship Night on November 9. Art photography by Deanna Woirhaye, teamed with music by Russ Litchfield, made one of the most enjoyable fellowship events of the year. Deanna's moodproducing photographs of nature, people and architecture, projected on a large screen, were embellished by a background of soft piano music.

Most Friends were familiar with some of Deanna's pictures, shown at Meetings for Worship, previous AFFN events, and local art displays. Some present had seen a preview of Deanna and Russ's collaboration at the September Peace Cafe. A greatly expanded program transported 36 Fellowshippers at this AFFN.

Before Friends sat down for their potluck meal, Deanna gathered the group in the courtyard for a Native American blessing. She walked around the circle of Friends with a smoldering bunch of sage, inviting each to smell the healing fragrance while she chanted a blessing in the Cherokee language.

Deanna's pictures documented her extensive travels, including animals and village scenes in Kenya, where Deanna went four years ago as a representative to the 6th World Conference of Friends, and the stunning avant-garde architecture of Barcelona, where she and husband Brendon went two years ago. And there were scenes from the Grand Canyon and other national parks in this country, even familiar scenes in our own city that became engaging tableaux in the artistic mind of Deanna.

Russ's background pieces seemed beautifully phased with the sequence of photos. One piece would wind down with a sunset scene and the next bright piece would introduce a sequence of close-up photos

Start 2017 Volunteering for the Cold Weather Shelter!

Every winter from November until March the Whittier Area Interfaith Council sponsors a Cold Weather Shelter to provide overnight hospitality for some of the homeless people in our Whittier community.

In January First Friends Church will be coordinating with our friends and neighbors at First United Methodist Church (FUMC) to house and feed up to 40 homeless people. FUMC is graciously opening their doors from Monday evening, January 9 until Monday morning, January 16. They will provide an accessible location for dinner and sleeping, and we will be pitching in with the meals and night supervision.

Our participation will be organized through the cooperation of two committees, Outreach and Christian Education. Sign-up sheets will be available in the courtyard as we begin to seek volunteers to help with cooking dinners, hosting, and overnight supervision. There is a need for supervisors (one male, one female) to be on site from 6 p.m.-12 a.m. each night and also from 12-7a.m. each morning. Coffee and a hot breakfast are also provided.

Please consider how you might want to serve. So let us join together with friends to warm our hands and our hearts at the Cold Weather Shelter in January!

Praise in Music Transports Worshippers

Music Sunday on November 6 began with J. S. Bach's "God's Time is Always Best" performed by the Handbell Choir, followed by the Call to Worship with modern composer Richard Proulx's "Te Deum Laudamus" ("Lord We Praise You") sung by the Friends Choir, accompanied by the Handbell Choir and Russ Litchfield on the organ.

The centerpiece of Music Sunday was Benjamin Britten's magnificent choral work "Rejoice in the Lord." This work, written in 1943, recaptures the transcendent spirituality of English poet Christopher Smart (1722-1771). As with many great writers, the value of Smart's work was not properly appreciated in his own time; in fact, he was for a time committed to an asylum for his "religious mania." The text of "Rejoice" is from "Jubilate Agno," a long poem written by Smart while in confinement.

Russ used the Children's Message to explain Christopher Smart's universalist religion to worshippers. All of God's creation, animate and inanimate, sings praises to the Creator. The Wonder Box contained a few life-like toy animals, including a skunk and a snake. Russ explained that each has its special talents, unique lifestyle, and place in the Great Scheme. Each is an existential tribute to the Creator. Even writing has its ordained role. Russ showed the children the letters "H" for "Spirit" and "L" for "Love," as per Smart's poem. The children remained seated on the stage while Baritone Ryan Hoffmann and Mezzo-soprano Allison Coop serenaded them with modern composer Barrie Capena's charming "A Modern Benedicite," a child's hymn of praise, while the offering was being taken.

"Rejoice in God, O ye tongues. Give the glory to the Lord." The choir sang this opening phrase of Britten's work, introducing examples from Smart's poem of famous animals who came forth to praise God with instructive stories: Balaam's ass, Ishmael's tiger, and Daniel's lion. Soprano soloist Samantha Sanchez followed with Smart's charming tribute to his cat Jeoffry, whose elegant grace extols its Maker. Then came Allison Coop with Smart's praise of the humble mouse, who, Smart claimed, is really a creature of great valor that will defend its mate even against the prodigious cat!

Tenor Evan Mooney sang lines of the poem that were appreciated by all worshippers present: "For the flowers are great blessings...For the flower glorifies God." Baritone Ryan came on with the sacredness of

Outreach & Mission Projects

Before we say farewell to 2016, the Outreach Committee (OC) would like to update our Meeting on the outcome of a few events and projects organized for members to participate in throughout the year.

Springtime and fall, our committee changes Fellowship Hall into a "Peace Café." A place where friends and the community can dine, listen, hang out and enjoy the presence of peace-minded people. Dinner, music, art and dance entertain each friend who walks through our doors. Our hostesses, JoNita Beede and Holly Overin share their musical talent, oversee the scheduling of performers and invite crafters to sell their art or special wares. All funds raised during these two evening events help our *Summer Peace Camp* program for children ages 5 to 13, offering scholarships, purchasing supplies and creating learning activities. The camp is held during the last week in July. This year's theme: *Earth: Respect, Preserve and Protect.*

During the month of June, we asked members to supply seed packages or make a donation toward *American Friends Service Committee – Los Angeles* project: *Roots for Peace: Building Healthy Communities.* The program was designed in 2009, working with young people to develop their leadership and community organizing skills around food justice, urban gardening, and health and nutrition. Through the program, youth gain the skills to critically analyze issues and implement community-action projects that address health inequities in Los Angeles. Crystal Gonzalez, Roots for Peace Program Coordinator, teaches about the power of hands in action. Crystal was overwhelmed over the support our meeting gave.

June 11, OC hosted a special luncheon event for Friends Committee on Legislation (FCLCA), inviting Kevan Insko, Director of Development and Outreach, to our meeting. The idea was to enlighten Southern California Friends and the community about the importance of lobbying. FCLCA is a nonpartisan, statewide public interest lobby founded by Quakers in 1952. Their supporters include people of all backgrounds and beliefs. FCLCA advocates for California state laws that are just, compassionate and respectful of the inherent worth of every person. Together, we can bring a voice of conscience to

Friends United Meeting (FUM) Summer Mission Project was design to help Friends Theological College (FTC) in Kaimosi, Kenya. The Power for Pastors project focused on raising funds to assist in purchasing Solar Panels. FTC Library is semi-computerized, power is needed to check materials in and out; research for information; classifications and cataloging. With no power, FTC can't function. Each panel costs \$1,500. This cost covers installation, wiring, battery and inverters. They need 32 panels to cover the building. OC Mission support program started July 3, ending September 4, raised a little over \$800.

This month, Outreach and Christian Education Committees are joining together to host a *Tree of Christmas Peace* mission project. Please take time to read about this upcoming program and to post the dates in your calendar. In January, FFC will be helping with the Cold Weather Shelter program. The 2017 Outreach Committee members will continues to seek, review, connect and create ways our meeting can lend a helping hand following His leading.


