As the holiday season winds up to the climax of Christmas, I find myself thinking about the "reason for the season." According to the church calendar, Advent is four weeks of repentance and preparation, opening ourselves to contemplate



hope, love, peace, and joy. It is anticipation of the coming of the Christ child, the Prince of Peace, the Light.

What is it that means most to you in this time? For some of us, it will be anticipating time with family we have not seen for a while. For others, it will be gathering with friends. For still others, it will be planning all the special treats that come with the season: trees and decorations, scrumptious meals and treats, presents tucked safely under the tree, the look on a child's face or a loved one's embrace. 

At Meeting for Worship on December 18, the Friends Choir will present a musical service based on these 'O' Antiphons. We will begin with an arrangement of *O Come*, *O Come Emmanuel* for solo handbells, played by Linda Krantz. We will sing musical settings of each antiphon by Peter Hallock, followed by a reading from scripture, a hymn or anthem, and a short poetic prayer. Hallock's settings begin with the Latin text chanted, followed by a choral setting with organ. The *Song of Mary* by Ronald Arnatt will be sung after the final antiphon, followed by open worship. We will conclude with the singing of *O Come*, *O Come Emmanuel*.

It is our hope that these texts and musical settings will lead to a deeper experience of Christmas.

Over three days, Friends gathered in Fellowship Hall to meet with lawmakers, participate in Meetings for Worship with a Concern for Business, and hear exciting messages from Friends in action.

seasoning are:

- Do you have a stated mission statement? (That's an easy one for us--we do, it's on the bottom of page one of every issue of *The Living Light*!). But the second part of this query requires more pondering: If so, how is it being faithfully expressed right now?
- What are models that are working in your meeting?
- Where do you see misalignment? What are the obstacles (clutter) getting in the way of you faithfully living into your mission?
- How do we create communities of spiritual practice?
- How do we develop our committees as formational spaces of worship?
- How do we help Friends truly listen to God?
- How do we do away with "parking lot discussions"? How can we enable Friends to have full and honest conversations in the context of meetings in community rather than afterward or outside the Meeting?
- Do we see Quakerism as an aging religion without a need for or focus on growth? Or are we comfortable and satisfied with things the way they are and resistent to change?
- How is our Meeting going to be sustainable and how to do we reach younger people, connect with our neighbors, and integrate them into our loving community?

And finally, perhaps the widest-ranging query of all:

How do we share our story with others?
 Which one(s) of these are most important to you?

Who knows--our first encounters as Flourishing Friends may develop into a mission to maintain a continuing discussion with Quakers all over the world in unity!
