with was thankful hearts that Whittier Friends School elementary children prepared and enjoyed a full spread of foods for their annual Feast Day, this year held on Friday, November 17. Children kindergarten through fifth

RIGHT SHARING: "THE POWER OF ENOUGH"

Jackie Stillwell brought the Worship Message on First Day, October 29. Her title "The Power of Enough" describes the philosophy of Right Sharing of World Resources, the Quakerled community development organization of which Jackie has been Executive Secretary since 2015. RSWR is a unique US-based village self-help program operating in India, Kenya, Sierra Leone, and Guatemala. Ruth Bueso, RSWR's Guatemala Coordinator, accompanied Jackie on her visit to First Friends.

Right Sharing of World Resources grew out of concerns expressed at the Fourth World Conference of Friends in Guilford, NC, in 1967. These included finding ways to improve the economy of impoverished people living in developing countries. Since its inception as a program of the Friends World Committee for Consultation, and later as an independent organization, RSWR has come to concentrate on empowerment of women as a major means of economic development. Jackie emphasized the importance of Friends' testimonies of simplicity and equality to world peace and prosperity and the role played by RSWR in this effort.

Jackie's worship message was followed by a buffet lunch in Fellowship Hall and a slide show description of RSWR's activities narrated by Jackie and Ruth. RSWR operates through a country's Coordinator (Ruth is Guatemala's Coordinator) who identifies local groups seeking funding for industries such as small vegetable farms, dairies, or brick- making operations. These are encouraged, if they seem worthy, to apply to RSWR for small grants, offered as loans, to be repaid from proceeds of the new industry. The RSWR Board of Trustees, mostly members of Friends Meetings in the US, judges the proposals and makes recommendations for funding. The success of this system of "microlending" has proven very successful, as evidenced by the fact that 97% of the loans have been repaid within the first year or two of operation of the new industry.

Ruth Bueso described women's self-help efforts in her country. There are now more than a dozen groups that sponsor community-building activities, including educational seminars on improving women's status in Guatemala, seeking to build concepts of self-esteem, community, conflict resolution, and decision-making. Jackie also has a personal interest in Guatemala, having lived in that country for ten years, three of those as a Peace Corps worker.

Advocacy Team Hosts FCNL Event: "Democracy Beyond Voting"



Our own Advocacy Team was recently joined by other interested community members for a day of FCNL's Quaker Public Policy Institute. The event, which included local teams from across the country, was presented online from Washington, D.C. We heard from speakers about lobbying, writing letters to the editor, investing peacebuilding, local the current Israel-Palestine conflict, and the future of peacebuilding itself. Many speakers were eloquent and powerful, sharing their own very personal experiences as they advocate for peace.

We were also joined by a live visit from Nicholas Hernandez, from Senator Laphonza Butler's office. Nicholas shared his thoughts and insights on lobbying, but he also fielded questions and listened attentively as we shared our own concerns about peacebuilding and intersectional issues, such as immigration, the environment, and other very current events. It was a meaningful dialogue. We hope that this gathering will motivate others to share their voices and participate more directly democracy.

An energy was felt in the room, and we thank our own Advocacy Team members who shared their experience with new community members. We are also grateful for our able Tech Team for the set-up, and extend gratitude to Carrin Bouchard who helped to prepare refreshments for our guests and Team Members.




- 1) Clean, screw top, prescription bottles with labels removed.

IN THE CAUCASUS WITH KATHY

All Friends Fellowship Night is in full-swing this year after a long pandemic layoff. On Nov. 8, world traveler Kathy Marin brought a slide show documenting her tour earlier this year of the Transcaucasian countries of Azerbaijan, Georgia, and Armenia. Her presentation followed a sumptuous potluck supper organized by Mary Marshburn and the Hospitality Committee.

Kathy's tour began in Baku, the capital of Azerbaijan. This city on the Caspian Sea is both very old and ultramodern. The Royal Palace of the former Shahs contrasts with the graceful avant- garde architecture of the Performing Arts Center. This and many other beautiful modern buildings are the result of petroleum revenues: Azerbaijan is one of the world's largest oil- and- gas producers. Representing extreme antiquity are the 20,000-year-old lithographs (engraved rock inscriptions) near Baku.

From Baku, Kathy's illustrated narrative took Fellowshippers into the Caucasus Mountains, with its beautiful scenery and quaint rural cultures. Copper-working and rug-weaving are examples of folk-industries described by Kathy. Her group witnessed a charming ceremony in honor of a bride-to-be and actually got to participate in the communal dancing.

The group entered the country of Georgia at one of the four border-crossings. Previously a Soviet republic, Georgia became independent in 1981. Georgia is a dominantly Christian country - actually the second nation to adopt Christianity as the official state religion, after Armenia. Tbilisi, the capital city, has several World Heritage Sites. These include a basilica built in the 6th Century and a monastery with monk's living quarters, no longer occupied, carved into rocky cliff sides. The tour group visited a unique community of identical three-room houses built in 2007 for the 60,000 refugees from fighting in the break-away re-



gion of Abkhazia in northern Georgia. Kathy noted that Josef Stalin was a native of Georgia. Georgians discreetly avoid mention of the pogroms and gulags of the Soviet Stalinist regime.

The snow-covered Caucasus Mountains extend into Armenia. The tour group avoided the Nagorno-Karabakh region, still under dispute, sometimes violently, between Azerbaijan and Armenia. Armenia calls itself the oldest Christian nation: the Armenian Apostolic Church was founded in the First Century, and Armenia was declared officially Christian in 302 CE. Kathy showed pictures of the world's oldest Christian cathedral near Yerevan, the capital. A choir of five beautifully-costumed young women performed ancient religious chants for visitors to the cathedral.

Yerevan lies at the foot of Mt. Ararat, the legendary lodging place of Noah's Ark after the Deluge. In Yerevan, Kathy's group visited the Armenian Genocide Memorial, created in memory of the 1.5 million Armenians that were deported by the Ottoman Empire in 1916 and left to die in the Syrian Desert. Kathy's presentation ended with beautiful pastoral scenes with Mt. Ararat in the background. Friends expressed great appreciation to Kathy for yet another memorable virtual excursion.
